This third and totally revised edition of *A BALLAD OF AMERICA* is designed for classroom use and for ease of reproduction. An 11 x 8 ½" format makes possible a generous layout and easily legible text, lyrics, music, and illustrations. Detailed commentary places each song in its proper historical context. Simple guitar accompaniments are provided for the use of both students and teachers. The book contains 135 songs that tell the story of the United States covering a span of 350 years from the 17th to the 20th centuries. For clarity of exposition *A BALLAD OF AMERICA* is divided into seven parts and sixteen chapters reflecting both the time span and the various topics covered. The book brings under a single cover some of the best to be found in the back issues of *FOLKSONG IN THE CLASSROOM*, and also much more.
